

June 14, 1951: The U.S. Census Bureau takes delivery of UNIVAC 1, the world's first commercial electronic computer, from manufacturer Remington Rand. The device weighed in at 16,000 pounds and used 5,000 vacuum tubes.

February 6, 1952: King George VI dies. Princess Elizabeth, his oldest child, immediately succeeds him as sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and is crowned Queen Elizabeth II on June 2, 1953.





May 29, 1953: New Zealander mountaineer Edmund Hillary and Tibetan sherpa Tenzing Norgay become the first persons to reach the top of Mount Everest the highest point on Earth.



1950s: During what is widely considered the "Golden Age of Television," scores of classic TV programs spanning numerous genres debut on TV screens across the United States, such as "Truth or Consequences," "I Love Lucy," "Dragnet," "The Today Show," "The Tonight Show," "The Honeymooners," "Captain Kangaroo," "Gunsmoke," "The Huntley-Brinkley Report," "American Bandstand," and "Twilight Zone." The percentage of Americans that own TV sets climbs from about 10% in 1950 to 86% in 1959.



July 18, 1953: At Sun Records in Memphis, Elvis Presley records his first songs - "My Happiness" and "That's When Your Heartaches Begin."


June 29, 1956: The Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956 is signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The law provides \$26 billion of federal funding for the construction of a 41,000 mile interstate highway system for "speedy, safe transcontinental travel" and "quick evacuation of target areas" in the event of an atomic attack on key U.S. cities.



October 8, 1956: Don Larsen of the New York Yankees pitches a perfect game in the World Series.



October 4, 1957: The Soviet Union launches the first man-made satellite into orbit. Sputnik I repeatedly orbits the Earth at 18,000 miles per hour for the next three months before burning up in the atmosphere. The "space race" is officially underway.



October 14, 1957: Lester Pearson, Canada's Secretary of State for External Affairs, is awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his central role in ending the Suez Crisis the previous year. Pearson is the first Canadian to win the honor. He would later serve as prime minister from 1963 to 1968.



October 7, 1958: NASA initiates Program Mercury, the United States' first human spaceflight program. Less than three years later, Alan Shephard became the first American to go into space.

December 28, 1958: In the first NFL playoff game decided in sudden death overtime, the Baltimore Colts beat the New York Giants 23-17 to win the NFL championship. It is widely regarded by sports journalists as the greatest game in NFL history.



January 3, 1959: The territory of Alaska, which the U.S. purchased from Russia in 1867, is admitted into the Union as the 49<sup>th</sup> state; Hawaii become the 50<sup>th</sup> state on August 21<sup>st</sup>.



June 26, 1959: The St. Lawrence Seaway is officially opened. The Seaway includes an intricate system of locks and canals, is nearly 2,500 miles long, and allows ships to travel between the Atlantic Ocean and all the Great Lakes for the first time.
