Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States extending the right to vote to citizena eighteen years of age or older.

Resolved by the Scaate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Contitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within asven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

"Astricus -

"SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are cighteen years of age or obler, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age, "Stee, 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate ligibilation."







William Ruckelshaus sworn in as first EPA Administrator.




January 12, 1971: "All in the Family" debuts on CBS, starring Carroll O'Connor and Jean Stapleton as Archie and Edith Bunker.

There is a demand for just about all of the furniture species, and prices are very firm, most items selling at as high as the top of the base periods. The sawmills which have prepared price lists often find their own individual collings are higher than our averages, and there have been some granted requests for advances by price category 1 operators.

<u>BASSWOOD</u>: 4/4 #18#2C sold at the \$165-\$100 level, and those shipping the FASBIF separately obtain \$20 to \$25 premium over our estimate which is for the FASBIF along with the #1C.

BEECH: 4/4, 5/4, 6/4 and B/4 #TCAStr ware reported, olong with some sizeable lots of the straight #2C; some of the 4/4 #ICBStr at S3:00 to 54:00 over our listings fob mill and moving long distances.

HICKORY: All thicknesses are wanted, and there is a little more interest in the 4/4 and 5/4, in addition to the large demands for the 6/4 and 8/4. The 5/4 is sufficiently stronger to merit a \$3.00 increase.

MARD MAPLE: There is an unsatisfied demand for the White Maple: and Unsalected Maple largely White is also wanted. Our estimates are as high as the base prices, but prices being reported range higher where the sawmills ship a larger percentage of White stock in the Unselected. The 4/4 f2824 is also wanted for export work at much higher prices, and we are bringPLAIN RED OAK: Our listings seem readily obtainable by the sawmills on the #IC&Btr Red Oak, and these are as high as the 1970 prices.

There is much more interest now in the 4/4 #283A. formerly used mostly by the Oak Flooring makers. Now the item is going to other uses in volume. So far as the Flooring Plants are concerned we have found only a limited interest at higher prices, the stock for this purpose selling at a top of \$85-\$75, with some of the larger sales at lower for the samills. We see only one area paying more for the #22 to be used for this purpose. The flooring makers seem willing to take the lumber either green or dry at the same lavels, but usually apply the green rule on the green, and there is a tendency to make a larger than \$10 spread between the #283A. The makers of truck floors and the furniture factories have a decided preference for dry stock, and such stock in our information shows high as \$90-\$80 fob saweills.

YELLOW POPLAR: Our reports show all thicknesses of FICABER as well as some lower grades, the principal #2% in 4/4 and 5/4, with some #28 in 4/4. Some of the 4/4 #1C ranges to \$175; to high as \$181 on the 5/4 #1C. The 4/4 #2% sold high as \$112 for green stock; 4/4 #28 high as \$77.

June 23, 1973: President Nixon's Executive Order 11723, signed on June 13th, is published in *Hardwood Market Report*. The order is intended to counter inflation and freezes prices for all commodities, including hardwood lumber, through August 12, 1973. Only raw agricultural products are exempt. In the August 18th issue of Hardwood Market Report - the first released after restrictions are removed - reported prices drive broad increases to the published listings in all regions.

THE PRESIDENT TITLE 3 EXECUTIVE ORDER 11723 FURTHER PROVIDING FOR THE STABILIZATION OF THE ECONOMY

ON JANUARY 11, 1973 I ISSUED EXECUTIVE ORDER 11695 WHICH PROVIDED FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF PHASE 111 OF THE ECONOMIC STABILIZATION PROGRAM. ON APRIL 30, 1973 THE CONGRESS ENACTED, AND I SIGNED INTO LAW, AMENDMENTS TO THE ECONOMIC STABILIZATION ACT OF 1970 WHICH EXTENDED FOR ONE YEAR, UNTIL APRIL 30, 1974, THE LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY FOR CARRYING OUT THE ECON-OMIC STABILIZATION PROCRAM OMIC STABILIZATION PROGRAM.

DURING PHASE III, LABOR AND MANAGEMENT HAVE CON-TRIBUTED TO OUR STABILIZATION EFFORTS THROUGH RE-SPONSIBLE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING. THE AMERICAN PEOPLE LOOK TO LABOR AND MANAGEMENT TO CONTINUE THEIR CON-STRUCTIVE AND COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS. PRICE BEHA-MIOR UNDER PHASE III HAS NOT BEEN SATISFACTORY, HOW-EVER. I HAVE THEREFORE DETERMINED TO IMPOSE A COM-PREHENSIVE FREEZE FOR A MAXIMUM PERIOD OF 60 DAYS ON THE PRICES OF ALL COMMODITIES AND SERVICES OFFERED FOR SALE EXCEPT THE PRICES CHARGED FOR RAW AGRICUL-TURAL PRODUCTS. I HAVE DETERMINED THAT THIS ACTION IS NECESSARY TO STABILIZE THE ECONOMY, REDUCE INFLA-TION, MINIMIZE UNEMPLOYMENT, IMPROVE THE NATION'S COMPETITIVE POSITION IN WORLD TRADE AND PROTECT THE PURCHASING POWER OF THE DOLLAR, ALL IN THE CONTEXT OF SOUND FISCAL MANAGEMENT AND EFFECTIVE MONETARY POLICIES. POLICIES.

NOW THEREFORE, BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES OF THE UNITED STATES, PARTICULARLY THE ECONOMIC STABILIZATION ACT OF 1970, AS AMENDED, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOL-LOWS:

SECTION 1. EFFECTIVE 9:00 P.M., E.S.T., JUNE 13, 1973, NO SELLER MAY CHARGE TO ANY CLASS OF PURCHASER AND NO PURCHASER MAY PAY A PRICE FOR ANY COMMODITY OR SERVICE WHICH EXCEEDS THE FREEZE PRICE CHARGED FOR THE SAME OR A SIMILAR COMMODITY OR SERVICE IN TRANSACTIONS WITH THE SAME CLASS OF PURCHASER DURING THE FREEZE BASE PERIOD. THIS ORDER SHALL BE EFFEC-TIVE FOR A MAXIMUM PERIOD OF 60 DAYS FROM THE DATE HEREOF, UNTIL 11:59 P.M., E.S.T., AUGUST 12, 1973. IT IS NOT UNLAWFUL TO CHARGE OR PAY A PRICE LESS THAN THE FREEZE PRICE AND LOWER PRICES ARE ENCOURAGED.

SECTION 2. EACH SELLER SHALL PREPARE A LIST OF FREEZE PRICES FOR ALL COMMODITIES AND SERVICES WHICH HE SELLS AND SHALL MAINTAIN A COPY OF THAT LIST AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC INSPECTION, DURING NORMAL BUSI-NESS HOURS, AT EACH PLACE OF BUSINESS WHERE SUCH COMMODITIES OR SERVICES ARE OFFERED FOR SALE. IN AD-DITION, THE CALCULATIONS AND SUPPORTING DATA UPON WHICH THE LIST IS BASED SHALL BE MAINTAINED BY THE SELLER AT THE LOCATION WHERE THE PRICING DECISIONS REFLECTED ON THE LIST ARE ORDINARILY MADE AND SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE ON REQUEST TO REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ECONOMIC STABILIZATION FORGAN. THE ECONOMIC STABILIZATION PROGRAM.

SECTION 3. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDER SHALL NOT EXTEND TO THE PRICES CHARGED FOR RAW AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS. THE PRICES OF PROCESSED AGRICULTURAL PRO-DUCTS, HOMEVER, ARE SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDER. FOR THOSE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS WHICH ARE SOLD FOR ULTIMATE CONSUMPTION IN THEIR ORIGINAL





October 16, 1978: The Polish cardinal Karol Wojtyla becomes the first non-Italian pope since 1523. He takes the name John Paul II and is head of the Roman Catholic Church until his death on April 2, 2005.






1978: Henry W. Jones Jr. of Memphis, TN begins his two-year tenure as president of the National Hardwood Lumber Association. That same year, he receives the coveted J.S.P. Wilson Award as Lumbermen of the Year from the Lumbermen's Club of Memphis. Mr. Jones eventually purchases Hardwood Market Report in 1987.

January 1, 1979: China and the U.S. establish diplomatic relations, 30 years after the foundation of the People's Republic.

US president Jimmy Carter, Zbigniew Brzezinski, and other U.S. officials meet in the White House Cabinet Room with Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping, 29 January 1979

March 28, 1979: An accident at the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant near Harrisburg, PA results in a partial meltdown that emits radioactive gases into the air. The EPA, U.S. Department of Health, U.S. Department of Energy, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Columbia University, University of Pittsburgh, and several independent organizations conduct extensive studies to identify adverse health affects for the estimated two million people exposed. According to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, exposed persons received an average radiation dose equivalent to about 1/6 the dose received during a chest X-ray. While opinions vary about the safety of nuclear power, no new nuclear power plants have been started in the U.S. since the Three Mile Island incident.

May 4, 1979: Margaret Thatcher, aka "The Iron Lady," becomes the first female prime minister of Britain.

July 1979: The National Hardwood Lumber Association moves into its newly constructed headquarters in Memphis, TN. The NHLA Inspection Training School - which had expanded to two different Memphis locations in those years due to high demand for its services - moves to the same site. The relocation of NHLA headquarters from Chicago to Memphis and consolidation of the school into the same location are the culmination of extensive efforts by scores of individuals, businesses, and industry associations that donated time, money, and materials to make it happen without NHLA acquiring any additional debt.

November 4, 1979: The Iran Hostage Crisis begins when Islamic revolutionaries take 66 Americans hostage. All female and African-American hostages are quickly released, but the remaining 52 hostages remain captive for 444 days.
